Introduction to 'A New Song'

An Advent liturgy is not just about looking forward to Christmas. Although this service is rich in its references to the Christmas festival, its main focus is the expectation of the fullness God's Kingdom of justice and peace on earth. It is a celebration of God "arriving" in many situations; it is an expression of all humanity's longing for God's kingdom, in this world and the next.

In this Advent liturgy, the character of God's Kingdom is explored, together with a focus on Blessed Mary, Mother of our Lord, who is a supreme example of faithfulness to God and love for Jesus. In Mary we see the grace of God in action: in her response to God and as a deeply spiritual person; responses to which all humanity are called.

So in this service we confess our own lack of holiness and obedience, and we renew our hope and trust in the promises of God. We pray for the Church and for the world that God's Kingdom may grow on earth. And we ask for the courage, vision and grace to play our faithful part.

The third movement of this liturgy, celebrating the Vision of God's Kingdom, concludes with the first real highpoint of the service, with the anthem that gives its name to the liturgy, 'A New Song' by James MacMillan, and the great Advent hymn, 'O come O come Emmanuel.'

The final movement of the service challenges us to be ready at all times to be part of the glory of God's Kingdom. It bursts upon us in the liturgy, reflecting the way that unexpected glimpses of the Kingdom suddenly illuminate people's lives.

The whole liturgy takes place as a movement from darkness to light. The lighted candles held by the congregation symbolise the light of Christ already given us in Jesus Christ. The light is also a symbol of our own willingness to trust in the promises of God, and to have courage and determination to work for the Kingdom on earth.

The liturgy is also a procession, symbolised by a progression in the places from where the readings are read. Our journey to the Kingdom is a pilgrimage; and liturgical processions are symbols of Christian pilgrimage. We follow in the way of the Cross, travelling by the light of the Gospel, travelling together while singing, praising and serving God.

Notes for using the CD in an act of worship

- Do print this complete service booklet so all the words can be available to the congregation, and so that all may enter fully into the devotion. Remember to add your CCLI number.
- The CD track numbers are indicated in the order of service in square brackets, e.g. **[CD tr.1].** If so desired, the length of the service can be trimmed by omitting tracks 7, 9 and 20.
- There are many spoken sections which can be read by a leader or reader together with the congregation. These are better offered in person rather than via the CD. The operator of the CD player should therefore familiarise themselves with going straight to a particular track. A technical rehearsal with the leader of the service is advisable.
- A few responsive sections of the full printed liturgical Order of Service are not included at all on the CD. These are indicated in the Order of Service booklet by double borders, as for this note.
- It is advisable to use as good and powerful sound system as is available for playing the CD in an act of worship. There is a lot of inspiring music and a good system will be more engaging and involving for the congregation.
- It is recommended that the congregation sings along with the CD for the hymns. As some of them may not be familiar, it might be good to have a rehearsal of one or two before the service.
- The congregation should be given handheld candles to use during the service, with stewards briefed to pass the light around at the appropriate points.
- The order recommends that the place from where each reading is read, progresses from the west end of the church up to the sanctuary. This can be accompanied by progressively switching on more and more lights in the church, as part of the congregation's journey from darkness to light.
